- inspired by the "Pavia protocol" signed between the National Association of Italian Municipalities and the Conference of Italian University Rectors in Pavia in September 2015;
- sets objectives and accompanying initiatives to make a concrete and visible contribution to the development of the local and regional communities;

- "Poitiers Declaration"= **10 joint actions** in favor of:
- Citizens education through access to knowledge and culture;
- **Transfer of innovation** from research laboratories to local socioeconomic world;

- Integration of University campuses within the Cities, in relation to the urban policy;
