Barriers


Diverse barriers: explicit, normative, implicit, cultural, self-imposed... especially difficult to overcome are the invisible, implicit

Connection with society and societal responsibility

Arqus: Seniors' Universities and intergenerational learning. Direct involvement in challenge-based collaborative programmes involving students, researchers, external stakeholders.

Engaged and responsible EUA? Shared policies in action permeating all activity. Arqus: cooperation with Ukrainian universities.







Challenges the Alliances face in its joint effort towards building a cooperation framework are primarily derived from the **diverse institutional organizational models and strategies**, in combination with the distinctive **local and national cultural**, **societal, political, and legal environments** in which they operate. CHARM-EU understands and embraces this level playing field and believes these differences contribute to enrich collaboration and its outputs.

The adoption of a common ground for open collaboration and fostered mutual learning has been conducted under two principles: respecting each partner's pathway; avoiding any kind of impression of quality assessment or ranking across institutions.


- By defending and protecting research culture in its own right

- By joining efforts behind the above and supporting the ERA and EAA




